# History

- First indoor shelter constructed in 2008
  - Approximately 4,300 sq. ft.





# **Animal Shelter Expansion Project**

- 2015 Facilities Master Plan Update
  - Design capacity of existing facility has been exceeded
    - Dogs 24
    - Cats 35
  - Does not have sufficient size to accommodate expected growth

## **Expansion Project**

- Expansion study conducted by Quorum:
  - Needs assessment
  - Expansion options
  - Phasing plan for proposed improvements
  - Interim improvements for annexation
  - Reviewed with City Council in June 2016

# **Expansion Project (cont'd)**

- Police Department site selected for new shelter
  - Reviewed with City Council in November 2016



### **Annexation Improvements**

- Whiskerville opened in December 2017
  - Added 2,400 sq. ft. for cats, veterinary exam room and breakroom/office space





### **Animal Advisory Board Expansion**

- Broaden the scope of the board to ensure new shelter meets the needs of the <u>community</u>
- Expanded Purpose:
  - Review policies, programs and practices of the current animal shelter
  - Review animal capacity calculations and animal population trends

### **Animal Advisory Board Expansion**

- Expanded purpose (cont'd):
  - Review/recommend policies, programs and practices for implementation in new shelter
  - Determine shelter program needs versus wants and identify budget needs of each
  - Recommend funding options for the programming of space
  - Recommend a capital campaign

### **Animal Advisory Board**

#### Work Completed (cont'd):

- Discussed other programs and recommendations related to the following items
  - Maddie's Fund (No Kill)
  - TNR
  - Owner surrender

#### No Kill

- Current City practices
  - Utilize the Maddie's Fund "No-Kill" strategies
  - Do not utilize the "No-Kill" label
  - We do what is best for the animal
- Board recommends maintaining the current practice

## **Trap Neuter Release (TNR)**

- Current City ordinance prohibits cats from running at large
- Variety of TNR programs
- Board recommends not adopting TNR program

#### **Owner Surrender**

- Process by which an owner surrenders a pet to the care of a shelter, animal control facility or rescue
- Sugar Land does not accept owner surrenders
  - Information is provided to owners regarding available resources
- Board recommends not taking owner surrender
  - Maintain current operations working with local resources
  - This has provided positive results
