 - City Council Workshop on Charter Review Commission recommendations

 - Memorandum summarizing the recommendations in lieu of an additional workshop

What is a Court of Record

- There are approx. 180 Municipal Courts of Record in Texas
- Provides residents and defendants with more just and efficient disposition of cases in the City
- Provide enhanced enforcement of City Ordinances
- Integrity of proceedings improved with recording of proceedings
- Trials governed by the Code of Criminal Procedures and Rules of Appellate Procedure

Requirements

- Controlled by Chapter 30, Government Code
- Ordinance establishing court of record
- Judge must be licensed attorney
 - 2 or more years experience
- Court reporter or record proceedings
- New court seal



Advantages of Court of Record

- Enhanced enforcement of city ordinances
- Increased jurisdiction for cases under LGC Ch. 54 & 214
 - Dangerous building cases
- Reduce number of appeals to county
- City retains fines on affirmative judgment of appeal

Impacts to the Court

- Cost of recording device
 - Planned and budgeted in FY20
 - Device installed in February
- Costs of transcription for defendants

Recommendation

- Staff recommends approval of Ordinance No. 2194
 - Establishing Sugar Land Municipal Court as a Court of Record
 - Setting effective date of July 1, 2020
